1) Welcome by facilitator – Linsey Cottrell, Conflict and Environment Observatory. Linsey Cottrell briefly welcomed the participants to the meeting.

 - Asking for volunteers to facilitate/chair meetings in future to rotate the responsibility.
 - Does the time work for everyone (12 noon UK time)? Please indicate suitable alternatives.
 - New participants introduced themselves.
- 3) Notices for the Working Group: Linkedin page set up, joining EHAN
 - Linsey Cottrell has set up a Linkedin page for the group, please join. It's a group called EIMA. Use
 the page to share links to useful resources, post resources directly (papers, training materials,
 etc.) (https://www.linkedin.com/groups/8933777/)
 - Environment and Humanitarian Action Network (EHAN) set up by UNEP/OCHA useful platform and would encourage members to join for networking/resources/webinars. Organisations can also endorse EHAN but a requirement to joining. CEOBS/HALO/NPA already members and will circulate useful and relevant information to EIMA (https://www.eecentre.org/partners/the-eha-network/)
- 4) Agree whether a voting policy is needed or is to be kept to poll/vote on items within meetings
 - Poll taken 50/50
 - Could also note objections to publications, decisions in writing
 - Opt-in system for publications or decisions could be an alternative; informality preferred
 - For now, agreed that we keep things informal and return to the issue

- 5) Discuss invitation for Working Group to brief the United Nations Inter-Agency Coordination Group on Mine Action (IACG-MA) on a quarterly basis. Agree whether an informal initiative or need to add to the TOR.
 - Cianna O'Connell provided details on this invitation
 - This group consists of UN agencies, chaired by UNMAS, meetings are quarterly
 - Invitation to EIMA co-conveners to present the group and its origins and objectives at next meeting (15 September), sensitize UN partners to environment as an issue
 - Share the presentation role among group members
 - How regular the updates, and how work with a rolling chair and who should do the updates: meetings are informal, mostly about information exchange – we can discuss and decide after 1st briefing about regularity, not sure about the issue of the rolling chair – most important is a focal point to connect with on setting up future meeting presentations
 - What kind of feedback could the EIMA group expect from the IACG?
 - Format: NGO briefing is at beginning (max 15 minutes), then UN meeting afterwards is closed
 - IACG issues statements, for instance on Covid impact, treaty processes
- 6) Agree and finalise TOR, including definition of membership topic and discussion items
 - Poll taken, results: 90% approved (1 abstention), 90% agree update every 12 months
- 7) Introduction to mineaction.net platform, followed by brief Q&A David Hewitson, Fenix Insights Ltd.
 - www.mineaction.net
 - David Hewitson provided a quick introduction to the mineaction.net site
 - It is a quick searching tool for the IMAS standards and what is "should" do or "shall" do or "may" do different degrees of compliance, for different stakeholders
 - Can filter topics such as environment by degree of compliance, stakeholder search engine pulls up relevant IMAS text can run cross cutting searches
 - Basic system is free and open to public
 - Fenix is conducting outreach Zoom sessions to introduce people to the system
 - Environmental standard (7.13) and appendices are searchable
 - Allows access to IMAS, brings up normative standards
- 8) Brief summary of findings from NPA/CEOBS consultation, followed by open discussion Linsey Cottrell, Conflict and Environment Observatory.
 - Online consultation on environmental issues and mine action among key mine action stakeholders – March 2020
 - 11 respondents
 - Asked if organizations had environmental policies, most said yes
 - But whether organizations report on environmental performance much less frequent
 - Important environmental issues:
 - Vegetation clearance
 - Pollution control
 - Post clearance land use
 - Waste management
 - Location of CDS
 - Lower ranking topics included climate change adaptation and soil erosion
 - Monitoring common practice: waste, soil/land quality, habitat/ecology, impact screening, and noise (didn't ask for monitoring methods and formats)

- o Not common practice: meteorological, dust and air quality, water quality
- Some reported doing no monitoring at all

- Would be great to do more surveys, get more in-depth information to encourage people, learn ideas and practices
- Would be good to involve national authorities in such surveys
- Will circulate future surveys around to the group
- 9) Presentation by Ayub Alavi, Afghanistan UNMAS on Environmental Sustainability and Mine Action, followed by open discussion.
 - Impacts of mine action on environment, not only social impact environmental impact could be negative when open up areas that were protected by presence of contamination
 - Survey of environmental safeguarding policies in mine action in Afghanistan:
 - Pre-operational safeguarding measures
 - Preliminary site assessments
 - Field operations
 - Beneficiary impacts
 - Implementation monitoring
 - Need to move beyond where environmental safeguard policies currently stop to address/ consider what happens after land is handed back to beneficiaries, communities:
 - Relation between people and ecosystem environmental sustainability of cleared lands
 need an integrated landscape approach
 - o Important to consider released land as part of the wider landscape
 - Trying to do more about this in Afghanistan work closely with local communities
 - Possible interventions: ecosystem disaster risk reduction, mitigation and adaption measures, environmental rehabilitation measures, sustainable land use, ecosystem perspective, providing small scale environmental grants and other funding mechanisms
 - Afghanistan: new projects require community livelihoods to be addressed
 - Funding a challenge to taking a broader perspective on post-clearance land use and environmental sustainability
 - This thinking already connects to what already occurs in mine action process in engaging with local communities, doing environment assessment
 - Two examples of planned projects on wider land management schemes both currently await UNDP funding

- Marceau Guilbaud: has written a paper about environmental impact of explosives this will be circulated to members for discussion at next meeting of the working group, ask questions – agenda item for next time
- New IMAS 10.6 incident reporting and investigation, can be useful for environment also includes near misses (useful for learning)
- 2nd review conference for CCM Rev Con position statement submitted on the Lausanne Action Plan highlighting need for attention to environment – trying to plan a side event – climate change adaptation and post-clearance land use as possible topics, but open to further suggestions
